We celebrate that from 1986 – 1998 eleven Regional Guilds were founded and are affiliated to the SAQG, as well as a number of smaller Groups. Eleven Presidents served since 1989 with dedicated committee members to evolve the National Guild to where we are today.

Our celebrations kicked off this year in March with the Dolos block for National Quilt Day, thanks to two of our very talented members. Thank you for celebrating with us and making your "voice" heard! The SAQG Travelling Exhibition "A Stitch in Time" is still a celebration of cloth and stitch until July and so is the SAQG Raffle quilt, for which tickets will become available soon.





Birthday Wishes from past Presidents

Members are assured that all personal information is kept strictly confidential and is not shared with anyone.



Quilting: older than 35 years...

Quilting, an ancient craft that spans the globe, has a rich and diverse history. Unfortunately, the exact origin of quilting is not well-documented, making it challenging to pinpoint its precise beginnings. However, here is some fascinating insights into the history of quilts:

Ancient Egypt: Some of the earliest known examples of quilting can be traced back to ancient Egypt. Quilted clothing and textiles were used for warmth and protection. Interestingly, quilted fabric was also employed as a shield against the scorching desert sun. The ancient Egyptians created cozy quilts to keep themselves warm during chilly nights!

Asia: Quilting has a long history in Asia, including Japan, Korea, and India. Evidence suggests that quilted clothing and bedding date back to at least the 4th century AD in these regions. Tombs and burial sites have yielded quilted textiles, emphasizing the importance of quilting in ancient Asian culture.

Europe: Quilting has been a popular form of needlework in Europe for centuries. Quilts from the Middle Ages provide glimpses into the creativity and craftsmanship of European women. The Crusades played a role in the evolution of quilting, with Turks wearing quilted fabric under their armour to stay warm in harsh climates.

United States: Quilting gained prominence in the United States during the 18th and 19th centuries. Women expressed their creativity through quilting while their men were away fighting wars or tending to farm work. Quilts became not only functional bed coverings but also works of art and storytelling.

The world's largest quilt is the AIDS Memorial Quilt. It weighs 54 tons and spans 1.2 million square feet. In 1987 it contained 1,920 panels commemorating people who died of AIDS. Now there are 48,000 panels. Most blocks are rectangles measuring 6 feet by 3 feet or roughly the size of a grave.



The world's oldest quilt in existence is the Tristan Quilt. It is in the Victoria and Albert Museum. It is believed it was made between 1360 and 1400.

Congratulations!

Our National Quilters' Guild is celebrating 35 years!

Any strong building rests securely on its foundations. It is this foundation that gives it the stability, flexibility, and strength to be able to withstand the elements of nature.



So too does the SAQG rest on a strong foundation: its members. It is the mission of the SAQG to foster an environment where all South Africans can reach their full potential in quilt making, nationally and internationally. The aims of the Guild are to promote South African quilters nationally and abroad, to establish basic rules and categories for the National Festivals and to support the Regional Guilds where possible.

Looking back on the past 35 years, I am happy to say that SAQG has done more than its job. Can you believe that this was written in 2004: The SAQG had entered the new technological age! Communication is increasingly done by email and today most regional Newsletters are sent electronically. Hard copies will soon be something of the past.

2004 saw the start of a certification programme for South African judges. Three tutor judges, Sue Prins, Rosalie Dace and Hazel-May Duncan, under the leadership of the SAQG portfolio holder for judging, Pat Mostert, spent two years getting the new judges qualified for this job. South Africa now has 18 accredited guilt judges spread reasonably evenly throughout all the different regions.

Under the tireless curatorship of Odette Tolksdorf, an exhibition of South African quilts has been entered into the World Quilt Competition since 2001 and in 2004 Paul Schutte took an exhibition of our quilts to the Alsace in France and taught lectures there. Again, five South African quilters took a very diverse SA exhibition to the Alsace in France in 2013 and I was involved with the judging of the international "Distortion" competition.

Pat Parker and Jenny Williams have taken quilts and their African inspired books to different countries and have taught many classes internationally.

Rosalie Dace has taken small exhibitions overseas and was nominated 'Teacher of the Year' by 'The Professional Quilter.'

Margie Garratt, with her 'Innovative Threads' exhibition took our fibre art to many different countries.

These South African quilters, and many like them that we do not know of, are the true PRO's of the SAQG and all its members and we thank them.

South African quilting is now well known and well respected internationally and our quilt teachers are in demand.

My best wishes go to all members of SAQG, and I know that the future of the Guild is in good hands.

Message from KZN Quilters Guild Chairlady: Ruth Archer

Imagine arriving at an International Quilt Show to see no quilts. That would be a disaster of great magnitude.

We do have quilts fortunately, but we need LOTS more. More quilts that belong to you and are sitting in your cupboard. (Check your rules though about 20 year old, moth eaten, flea ridden, greatly loved, cuddled and icked on quilts. They might not be acceptable.)

You may think that you're not good enough but has anyone loved your quilt, your colours or your design? Then enter it. Not all of us Josephine Soaps win prizes or are perfect in everything we produce but others have appreciated the beauty of it.

Minimum size is just 50cm by 50cm. You can make a quilt in 6 weeks... I know, I have not started one yet. If you have made a 100-little-voices-in-cloth for John Cole-Morgan, then it is just 20cm bigger.

The Philosophy of 35!

The number 35 accumulates business and material! The number 35 is also creative, especially in relation to expressing itself — and insists on the freedom to do so. 35 does like to have fun, especially when it involves its creative aspects and for expressing its personal sense of freedom. Other aspects of 35 include a tendency to be optimistic, tolerant, adventurous, and curious — so long as it fits within 35's sense of realism.

For 35, balance between material accumulation and building of works that benefit the community is important. Similarly, acquisition and exchange need to be balanced.

It approaches life with an eye to efficient accomplishment of goals.

The numerology essence of the number 35 generally is comfortable interacting with others, personally and socially.
